BOOK OF THE YEAR: YOUNGER READERS (1-6)

(In Alphabetical Order by Author and Illustrator)

(RRP) (SCHOOL)

1. Being Bee (Catherine Bateson)

\$16.95 \$13.55

Since her mother died, it'd been just her, her dad and her guinea pigs, Lulu and Fifi. A perfect, non-nuclear family. Exactly how Bee liked it. Nothing stays the same forever though, and when Jazzi moves in, bringing with her a whole new way of looking at the world and a whole lot of secrets, Bee knows things are going to be completely different from now on.

2. Tuckshop Kid, The (Pat Flynn) \$16.95 \$13.55

Hungry? Need Lunch? Mum's packed you curried banana and pickle sandwiches again? Only got a \$1.25 to your name? Then you need to see Matt, because Matt has an amazing talent... Some kids are good at footy, or handball, or tennis. Not Matt, though. Matt is an expert at Tuckshop. (\$1.25 = sausage roll and small choc milk, by the way...)

3. Macbeth and Son (Jackie French) \$15.95 \$12.75 Luke is studying Shakespeare's play Macbeth at school and dreams about Lulach and Macbeth at night. But gradually Luke realises they

8. Doodledum Dancing (Meredith Costain and Pamela Allen)

Here's a book of giggly, wiggly, squiggly poems. You can munch them for breakfast, you can crunch them for lunch, you can gobble them for dinner. But most of all - you can read them out loud, and share them with your friends again and again . . .

9. Ella Kazoo Will Not Brush Her Hair (Lee Fox and Cathy Wilcox)

Ella Kazoo is a young girl with a firm understanding of who she is and what she wants and she will do anything to avoid having her hair brushed. Her poor mother is beside herself with frustration as she watches Ella's hair get more and more out of control. But what happens when Ella's hair develops a mind of its own?

10. Amy and Louis (Libby Gleeson and Freya Blackwood)

This is a loving, moving, goose-bumping tale of deep friendship. Amy and Louis's lives are closely intertwined, until the day Amy and her family move to the other side of the world. Louis stops building towers, digging holes and staring at clouds. He no longer calls to anyone across the yard, the room or the fence, until he discovers how to rebuild their special bond.

11. Eight (Lyn Lee and Kim Gamble)

Eight and Timmy go everywhere together, including on a picnic with Mum and Dad. When they come back home, Timmy realises with horror that they have left Eight behind. Dad comforts Timmy by reminding him how strong and brave Eight is. Later, when Timmy is reunited with Eight, he realises that Eight is strong enough and clever enough to sleep by himself now.

12. Chatterbox (Margaret Wild)

Daisy the baby will not say a word. The family try everything to coax her into talking but she won't. One day, Daisy opens her mouth... and out comes a stream of sentences and questions about the world and everything in it, much to her family's complete surprise!

The falcons have lived here for as long as they know. Like all peregrines, they hunt birds for food. But now fires have scorched their bushland bare. The smoky wilderness is silent, with rarely a movement or a flicker of feathers. It is time to find a new home. Can the birds adapt and survive?

29. Red Spikes (Margo Lanagan)

Ten electrifying new stories from Margo Lanagan. With enormous skill, Lanagan disturbs as she entertains, stimulating our minds and playing havoc with our hearts.

30. My Big Birkett (Lisa Shanahan)
