
- Are not actually related to giant pandas

BLUE WHALE

This huge animal, which can weight 4,000 kilograms, is poached for its ivory, meat, and skin.

SNOW LEOPARD

This animal, the largest on the planet, is at risk partly due to ship collisions and getting stuck in fishing nets.

Everyone else was chattering, unaware.


'Look,' I whispered.

The snow leopard turned its head towards us for a split second. Its mouth opened in a flash of pink.


I gasped.
