## **Pre Reading**

Hold the book the right way up, read the title and identify the author, and illustrator. There's only one name, so that means the same person is the author and the illustrator.

Now turn the book the other way around. What do you notice?

Look at the back of the book. Read the words.

Does this give you any idea of what the book might be about?

This book is designed to read by two people, at the same time. For classroom use, read through the book together, turning each page upside down to see the different text and different perspective on the illustration.

When you have finished reading the book all the way through, ask the students what they thought of it.

Did they like it? What was it about the book that they liked? If they didn't like it, what was it about the book they didn't like?

Ask if anyone has even seen a book like this before? Have some other books with similar illustrations, that can be seen in more than one way to read and compare. (\* there are some suggestions on the next page)

## **Art/Artists**

Ask the students what an artist is? What does an artist do?

Ask them if they think the illustrators of picture books are artists? Why or why not?

Illustrators have all different sorts of styles, and they illustrate for different purposes. In I SEE, I SEE it's all about the illustrations, but in most picture books the illustrations help to tell the story to help the story to come alive in different ways.

Have a selection of your favourite picture books, illustrated by different illustrators that represent various styles of illustration.

Talk about which ones the students like and which ones they don't and why?


Emphasize how lucky we are that we don't have to go to an art gallery to see beautiful paintings/pictures...we just have top open up a picture book.


# Other books that look at perspective through the artwork




