1. Sixth Grade Style Queen (not!) (Sheryl Clark and Elissa Christian) \$14.95 **\$11.95** I don't fit in my family or at school, I have friends but sometimes even they think I'm weird. I say dumb things, I wear stupid clothes, I can't make my hair behave some days the whole world looks wrong to me. Told in the form of a verse novel, Sherryl Clark brings to life all the beauty, vulnerability and pain of twelve-year-old emotions. Dawn doesn't know where she belongs. It's not with the style queens at school. And it's not at home, where all her parents do is fight. Even her best friend, Emily, doesn't seem to want to be best friends any more.

2. Shaggy Gully Times, The (Jackie French and Bruce Whatley)

Look! Up in the sky! Is it a bird? Is it a plane? No, it's a wombat, a sheep and a dancing kangaroo - And they're on the front page of The Shaggy Gully Times! The small bush town of Shaggy Gully is home to many animals, including local celebrities Mothball, Pete and Josephine. Pete the Sheep runs a successful hairdressing salon and Josephine is a renowned ballerina. Mothball is editor of the weekly newspaper, The Shaggy Gully Times. She also can't spell!

3. Amelia Dee and the Peacock Lamp (Odo Hirsch)

A funny, touching, thought-provoking novel, peopled with memorable characters and pulsing with ideas, from the inimitable author of Antonio S and the Mystery of Theodore Guzman and Hazel Green.

4. Winning the World Cup (David Metzenthen and Stephen Axelsen)

Behind Marco's house there is a paddock. Behind Nam's house there is a paddock, too; and behind Steffi's and Carlo's and Mitch's houses. 7. Shhh! Little Mouse (Pamela Allen)

Shhh! little mouse. Who is that sleeping? Will the little grey mouse find something to eat, or will he wake the sleeping cat? A delightful picture book for the very young from the best-selling, award-winning Pamela Allen.

8. Pearl Barley and Charlie Parsley (Aaron Blabey)

Pearl Barley and Charlie Parsley are different in every way. Pearly Barley loves death-defying missions, solving mysteries, talking very loudly and is a terrible show-off. Charlie Parsley prefers reading in quiet places to jumping off buildings, is scared of everything and everyone, and is painfully shy. So how on earth is it that they are such good friends...?

9. Cat (Mike Dumbleton and Craig Smith)

Share a day with Cat and find out how exhausting, exciting and downright dangerous life can be! A warm, funny picture book by two of Australia's top creators.

10. Trouble With Dogs! The (Bob Graham)

11. Night Garden, The (Elise Hurst)

When Sally paints a magical garden on the window of her room, it's the start of a mystical adventure. An enchanting tale brought to life by Elise Hurst's whimsical illustrations. One night while Sally is staying at her grandmother's old house, she discovers a mystical garden in the backyard. Transformed from neat hedges and flower beds, to twisted shapes and creatures, the garden is now a place full of hidden surprises and adventure!

12. Lucy Goosey (Margaret Wild and Ann James)

Lucy Goosey has been playing happily in the same pond all her life. Then comes time to fly away. She is so terrified of getting lost in the huge sky that she refuses to leave with the others. Only when her mother reassures her that no matter what happens, she will always come looking for Lucy Goosey, does Lucy Goosey feel brave enough to make the flight

PICTURE BOOK OF THE YEAR (13-18)

13. Peasant Prince (Anne Spudvilas and Li Cunxin)

The Peasant Prince is a picture book based on the story of Li Cunxin, the international best-selling author of Mao's Last Dancer. Now this moving, uplifting tale of the peasant boy who became a ballet star comes to life for even the youngest child, with stunning illustrations from an award-winning artist, and through Li's own inspirational words.

14. Island, The (Armin Greder)

Absolutely the story of our time - an amazing and powerful picture book, winner of several international awards and available for the first time in English. In the morning the people of the island found a man sitting on the shore, where fate and the ocean currents had set him and his frail raft in the night. When he saw them coming towards him, he rose to his feet. He was not like them. This internationally acclaimed, award-winning picture book is astonishing, powerful and timelv.

15. Ziba Came on a Boat (Robert Ingpen and Liz Lofthouse)

Ziba came on a boat. A soggy old fishing boat, which creaked and moaned as it rose and fell, rose and fell, across an endless sea... Ziba thinks of home as she sits in the crowded hull, held in her mother's arms as they journey towards a new land where they hope to find peace and safety. A beautiful, lyrical picture book about a little girl whose family has lost everything and their brave journey to make a new life. Full of hope for the future, the love and comfort found in families, and warm memories of home, this moving story is accompanied by stunning illustrations by the acclaimed Robert Ingpen.

16. You and Me: Our Place (Dee Huxley and Leonie Norrington)

Every morning Uncle Tobias goes fishing. Sometimes he is joined by two little boys. Together they spend the day moving from one place to another. Along the way they meet other friends of Uncle Tobias - Auntie Ruby and Old Isaac - and listen to stories about Uncle Tobias' ancestors and other times. The setting of this story is Darwin, but it could be any regional coastal town in the north of Australia, where Indigenous and homeless people live on the margins of society. You and Me: Our place is about difference - old and new cultures that exist side by side - but more importantly it is about sameness. About people enjoying ordinary things and accepting each other -and especially about children who move freely between cultures.

17. Requiem for a Beast (Matt Ottley)

A graphic novel masterpiece in picture book format unlike anything ever seen before. A boy goes on a journey of self discovery as a stockman in Far North Queensland. In an exquisitely illustrated collage of memory and dreamscape, the boy confronts a huge, rogue bull and realizes he must acknowledge the errors of the past before he can fully embrace the future.

18. Dust (Colin Thompson and 13 other illustrators)

In a perfect world, this book would not exist. But we do not live in a perfect world. At any given moment of any given day, there are people dying from natural disasters over which we have no control. Beyond natural disasters we add disasters of our making, but even if we all learn to live in peace, there will still be millions of people who need help. All royalties earned will be donated to the Save the Children organisation in Australia.

19. Australia's Deadly and Dangerous Animals (Michael Cermak)

This book is packed with detailed animal profiles and full-colour photographs to help children easily discover more about some of Australia's favourite animals. These simple-to-understand, well-designed fact files are perfect for school project work.

20. Girl Stuff: Your Full-on Guide to the Teen Years (Kaz Cooke)

With over 600 pages and heaps of cartoons, Girl Stuff has everything girls need to know about: friends, body changes, shopping, clothes, make-up, pimples (arrghh), sizes, hair, earning money, guys, embarrassment, what to eat, moods, smoking, why diets suck, handling love and heartbreak, exercise, school stress, sex, beating bullies and mean girls, drugs, drinking, how to find new friends, cheering up, how to get on with your family, and confidence.

21. Kokoda Track: 101 Days (Peter Macinnes)

The story of the Kokoda Track is the extraordinary story of a small force defeating a much larger one. It is the tale of the 550 men of the 39th Militia Battalion - called chocos because the regular soldiers thought they'd melt under pressure. In eight short and brutal weeks - from 20 August 1942 - these soldiers slowed, and eventually stopped, the advance of 6000 experienced Japanese troops of the Nankai division across the massive Owen Stanley range.

22. Antarctica Book: Living in the Freezer (Dr Mark Norman)

Antarctica needs our help. We may live a long distance away, but the way we live is affecting Antarctica. Global warming is reaching Antarctica and starting to melt glaciers, ice shelves and ice sheets. Unless we act soon, it will affect the wonderful animals that live there and change life on earth as we know it.

23. Parsley Rabbit's Book About Books (Frances Watts and David Legge) \$19.95 \$15.95 Takes the reader on a hilarious and stimulating journey through the world of books. An absolute treasure of a book for children from 3 - 7 years.

24. Ned Kelly's Jerilderie Letter (Carole Wilkinson and Dean Jones) \$16.99 \$13.59

Ned Kelly was a dangerous man - a thief, a bank robber and a murderer. Yet when he was sentenced to hang, thousands of people rallied to save his life. In the Jerilderie Letter we hear from Ned in his own words. Wicked, angry, vividly descriptive; this is Ned's justification to his countrymen of how it all transpired.

25. Pharaoh: the Boy who Conquered the Nile (Jackie French)

Tragedy befalls Narmer when an unexpected encounter with a crocodile changes the path of his assured future. Now lame and horribly scarred, he is less than perfect and no longer the Golden One. His brother Hawk will be King of Thisis. And rather than remain as Hawk's Vizier, Narmer decides to leave his home and take his chances with the Trader, whose healing skills have saved his life. In their travels, Narmer learns much about faraway lands and people and his place in the world. Most of all, he learns what it means to be a true king and leader. Ages 10-14

26. Ghost's Child, The (Sonya Hartnett)

This is a romantic tale about a young girl's love for a boy called Feather. An old woman named Matilda comes home to find a teenage boy sitting in her living room. She does not know who he is but does not think it odd to find a complete stranger sitting on her couch, waiting. The old woman tells the boy the story of her life: how she fell in love with Feather. She had a question she was desperate to ask him and when he answers her question, she travels back to the real world and gets on with her life. An afterlife story.

27. Marty's Shadow (John Heffernan)

He had to run. To escape the voices. They weren't there yet, but they were coming. He could feel them. If he ran hard and fast enough he might be able to escape them a little longer. If he pushed himself until his thighs ached and his heart pounded, they might fall back and leave him to the peace and quiet of the hill... Marty's a boy who is troubled by shadows. It might be something to do with his mother, or something that happened a long time ago. For a while his friend Nariah makes the shadows go away, but not for long.

28. Love Like Water (Meme McDonald)

She stole a look at the man in the driver's seat. Sometimes Jay seemed as familiar as her own self. Other times he was as different as another language. Cathy arrives in Alice Springs from cattle country, looking for a new way to live. But 'new' is a serious challenge for a girl who's used to being measured by her actions, not her feelings. Feelings are slippery, like water. They escape through your hands. Love Like Water is a story of white girl, black boy. It's a story of city and country, self and other, love and friendship. And it's a story of identity, and the many different versions of Australia.

29. Black Water (David Metzenthen)

Farren Fox has lost his mother. His brother, Danny, is over fighting at Gallipoli and his dad, a fisherman, spends his life out at sea on a couta boat named for Farren's mother, the Camille. His mate, Robbie, has lost his father at Gallipoli, and Farren worries about Danny. Then tragedy strikes - his father is caught at sea in a huge storm. He drowns, leaving Farren alone until Danny returns injured and traumatised from Gallipoli. He slowly begins to improve, and the two boys begin to rebuild their lives, helped by a remarkable little girl, Souki, a part Aboriginal girl who Danny rescues from a shipwreck.

30. Leaving Barrumbi (Leonie Norrington)

Dale stands up hanging onto the wire cage of the Toyota and sees his home. Long Hole, shrinking away. The rusty iron roofs of the old people's houses at bottom camp are already disappearing into the red soil. And suddenly it hits him that he's leaving. He was born here at Long Hole, he's been here all his life, never slept anywhere else except for camping and fishing. Third novel in the 'Barrumbi' series, following The Barrumbi Kids and The Spirit of Barrumbi. In schools the book could be used in the study of several themes, including Indigenous culture, adolescence, friendship, families, and the environment.
